

The Concours musical international de Montréal (CMIM) aims to nurture the next generation of musicians destined for a professional career and to promote these artists within the international community, all while making classical music accessible to as many people as possible.

The CMIM has earned an outstanding international reputation. It is a showcase for the cultural riches, open spirit and welcoming atmosphere that characterize Montréal.

Founded in 2001 by internationally renowned bass Joseph Rouleau (1929–2019) and politician and philanthropist André Bourbeau (1936–2018), the CMIM is now one of the most prestigious music competitions in the world.

The CMIM is a member of the World Federation of International Music Competitions.

The Voice 2022 edition... We looked forward to it for long months, dreaming (beyond the restrictions of the moment) of what it could be. We envisioned a celebratory gathering that would bring us together again. We believed in Voice 2022, and our small but mighty team worked hard to make it happen. VOICE 2022 Edition

The 20th anniversary edition of the Concours musical international de Montréal was dedicated to the voice. 31 young singers selected from among the most promising talents of their generation came to put their talents on display from May 31 to June 9, 2022.

The artists participated in two divisions, Aria and Art Song, competing for more than \$220,000 in prizes and awards to help advance their international careers.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

The difference lies in genre and repertoire. **Aria** features voice with orchestra, usually in works from an opera, operetta, oratorio or a large-scale vocal work. **Art song** is more intimate and highlights a text through the interplay of voice and piano in musical dialogue.

These genres require different skills, techniques and even venues to best showcase the gesture and intent of the composers and their work.



THE DELICATE WORK OF THE JURY

Like the audience, the jury members are looking for their favourites and for the great artists of the next generation. They consider technical ability and, above all, musical personality.

The jury selects the semi-finalists and finalists for each division by averaging individual scores, but laureates and prize winners are determined by a majority vote. Jury members are not permitted to discuss the artists amongst themselves during the competition.

Initiatives and other activities

ANNIVERSARY OF THE CMIM

SPOTLIGHT ON **COLLABORATIVE PIANISTS**

Collaborative pianists lie at the heart of the vocal arts, and we wanted to highlight their key role in the Art Song division. In addition to offering a special prize for the pianists, the CMIM held an open round table on the topic. This event, now available online, was presented in partnership with the Université de Montréal and McGill University as part of the new McGill-UdeM Piano-Vocal Accompaniment Residency program, created thanks to the support of the Azrieli Foundation.

Harriet Burns, second prize winner in the Art Song division, has been invited to return to Montréal this spring to participate in the new residency. This initiative further strengthens CMIM's ties with these top educational institutions in Montréal.







MASTER CLASSES

The CMIM seized the opportunity of the inspiring presence of its prestigious jury members by holding four master classes featuring 16 local students. Sir Thomas Allen, Robert Holl, Adrianne Pieczonka and Christine Schäfer presented masterclasses in partnership with the Atelier lyrique de l'Opéra de Montréal, the Conservatoire de musique de Montréal, McGill's Schulich School of Music and Université de Montréal. These events were made possible with the support of the JM Canada Foundation.

CELEBRATING 20 YEARS

The CMIM celebrated its 20th anniversary edition in a big way throughout the event. A retrospective of our history was shared in several articles throughout the souvenir program. We highlighted the people who have made our organization what it is today and shared cherished memories with our audiences.

OPENING OUR DOORS TO LOCAL YOUTH

The CMIM launched its Sorties Jeunesse program by inviting students from the Sainte-Catherine-de-Sienne school to our concerts. This program helped promote equal opportunities for Montreal youth by providing access to classical music. Participants even got to determine the winners of two special Montréal Students' Coup de coeur Prizes. This initiative by CMIM, the Fondation pour les élèves de Montréal and the Centre de service scolaire de Montréal (CSSDM) was supported by the CDPQ.

The CMIM in 2021-2022

Career development for past winners, forging ties with our community, planning for the future... In the shadow of a spectacular edition, the CMIM is always working on new projects and looking ahead.

SHARING OUR EXPERTISE

As a member of the World Federation of International Music Competitions (WFIMC), the CMIM was actively involved in the discussion on the return of music competitions around the world post-pandemic. In September 2021, our Executive and Artistic Director, Christiane LeBlanc, was invited to join an international panel to talk about the success of our Piano 2021 edition as well as its challenges. In summer 2022, our Director of Artistic Development, Shira Gilbert, represented the CMIM in discussions and debate during the WFIMC General Assembly in Bydgoszcz, Poland.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

The CMIM began an ambitious strategic reflection process, dreaming big and imagining what the competition will look like over the next decade. The results will be presented in 2023. This process would not be possible without the help of our network. We consulted with 76 partners, friends and artists, and members of the local and international music community, all under the expert guidance of Isabelle Demers, a business, communications and commercial strategy consultant.



CMIM WINS AN OPUS AWARD

In 2022, the CMIM was recognized by Québec's music community and scored a major victory, winning the CQM's "Musical Event of the Year" Opus Award for the all-digital edition of our Piano 2021 competition. This award celebrates our efforts to reinvent the organization, to maintain the precious ties between artists, the music community, partners, and audiences. Our victory was a balm that helped reinvigorate the team as we worked towards Voice 2022.

The Blossoming Careers of our Laureates!



First Prize winner of the Piano 2021 virtual edition, **Su Yeon Kim** finally makes her debut with Orchestre symphonique de Montréal in September 2022, performing Beethoven's *Fourth Piano Concerto* under the baton of conductor Osmo Vänskä.

The Salzburg-based pianist also performs recitals at Elbphilharmonie Hamburg, NDR Hannover, and in Düsseldorf

This spring we can expect the international release of her debut album on the Steinway & Sons Label, featuring works by Mozart.

As part of her visit to North America this fall, Su Yeon Kim will take advantage of a week-long residency at the Banff Centre for the Arts, part of her prize package for Piano 2021.

"I have been waiting to come to Montréal for a long time, since 2020! I'm very excited and grateful for this first visit to the city that has literally changed my life, to meet great people there, and to perform with the OSM the fourth piano concerto by Beethoven, absolutely my favorite one.

I am sure it will bring me enormous joy and experiences, as well as lots of new inspiration. I hope that I can pay back my gratitude for the great support I have received through the great music!"

First Prize laureate of Violin 2019, *Hao Zhou* recently performed duos for violin and orchestra with Violin 2006 laureate *Jinjoo Cho* in Cleveland, and a recital for the OSM Classical Spree Festival. Hao also continues to tour widely across the US and Canada with his award-winning Viano String Quartet.

Beatrice Rana, winner of Piano 2011, recently thrilled audiences in a solo recital at Carnegie Hall and on tour across Europe with Yannick Nezet-Séguin and the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra. The Italian pianist's Chopin album for Warner Classics was awarded the Diapason d'Or for the most outstanding classical recording of 2021.

Charles-Richard Hamelin, laureate of Piano 2014, performed in recital in Switzerland and Germany, as well as with Les Violons du Roy at the Lanaudière Festival. His two recent albums of Beethoven Sonatas, with violinist Andrew Wan for the Analekta label, were critically acclaimed and warmly received by the public, garnering numerous awards including a JUNO, a Félix from ADISQ, and a Prix Opus.

The critically acclaimed debut album from Canadian mezzo-soprano *Emily D'Angelo* (Voice 2018), *enargeia*, won a JUNO Award, was named one of NPR's Best Albums of 2021, and is nominated for Germany's *Opus Klassik* awards. This rising star has been heard recently at the Metropolitan Opera, Covent Garden, and La Scala in Milan.



Bomsori Kim's (Violin 2016) solo album, Violin on Stage, features works by Wieniawski. Waxman. Saint-Saëns and more. Bomsori was heard this past summer at the legendary New York Philharmonic "Concerts in the Parks" with music director Jaap van Zweden.



Hera Hyesang Park (Voice 2015) follows up her debut album, I am Hera — arias by Gluck, Handel, Mozart, and Bellini with the Vienna Philharmonic — with a new album for the Yellow Label this season. The soprano has been heard this season at Glyndebourne, the Metropolitan Opera, and on tour in Korea.




